



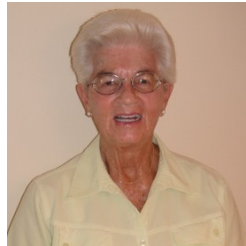

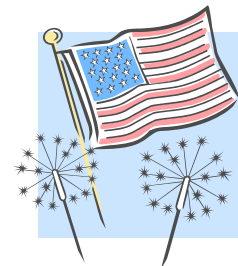

## Director's Notes



We had an excellent turnout for our hurricane seminar in June and I am sure that those who attended are going to be well prepared in the event we have a hurricane coming our way. For those who did not attend the seminar, we will be issuing an Emergency Guide later this month as a handy reference for what to expect in the event of a hurricane and how you should be preparing in advance of the projected landfall. This guide also contains other safety tips and evacuation procedures in the event of a fire.

Since this hurricane season is expected to be more active than in the recent past, I would like to remind everyone that even with a minimal hurricane, electrical power may be disrupted, possibly for days. Remember that the emergency generators in our community only power the elevators and emergency lighting in the Arbor Trace mid-rises and Tower Pointe. If you are dependent upon an oxygen concentrator or other medical devices that require electricity, you need to have a back-up plan. I would highly encourage any resident that has this type of situation to pre-register with Collier County Emergency Management and reserve space in their Special Needs Shelter. If you would like information about this program, forms are available at the Tower Pointe Concierge desk and the Clubhouse Reception desk.

Something else that is important to note is that if a hurricane is projected to make landfall in our vicinity, Arbor Glen may have to evacuate its residents if the threat is severe enough that it would be unsafe to shelter in place. Arbor Glen can only provide for those residing in Arbor Glen 72 hours prior to any projected landfall of a hurricane. Once we reach this point, admissions are closed until the threat has passed. If you plan to use Arbor Glen as your safe haven, please note that we are unable to care for more than the 32 residents that we are licensed for. It is also important to note that in the event we are forced to evacuate Arbor Glen, there will be no nursing personnel on hand to respond to your medical emergencies should one arise as they must go with the Arbor Glen residents to whatever site we evacuate to. Although minimal maintenance staff does remain on site in the event of a mandatory evacuation, their primary responsibility is to secure the property and to mitigate any damage to building structures caused by the hurricane. It is also likely that County Emergency Medical personnel may not be able to respond to medical emergencies if sustained winds make it unsafe for them to be on the road.

In closing, let me apologize if I sound like the voice of doom. I just want everyone to understand how important it is that you take personal responsibility for your safety and welfare. If anyone has concerns or questions about what you should be doing to prepare, please call me personally to discuss your individual situation.

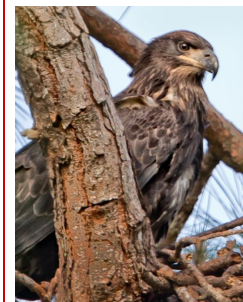
## Two Old Friends

George accompanied John and they are a wonderful duo. We hope they will do another program for us. How lucky we are to have residents with such talents. -Merle Bauser

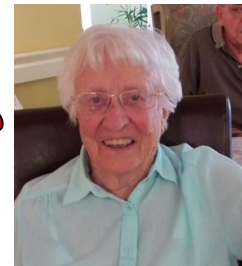


## Arbor Trace Eaglet

**Trip to Rookery Bay**

We enjoyed a wonderful afternoon at Rookery Bay on Monday, June 6<sup>th</sup> learning about the Reserve. Located at the northern end of the Ten Thousand Islands on the gulf coast of Florida, the

Rookery Bay Reserve represents one of the few remaining undisturbed mangrove estuaries in North America.

We visited the Learning Center, which represents the 110,000 acres of pristine mangrove forest, uplands and protected waters of Rookery Bay. We learned about how the rivers and streams meet the sea, and a unique habitat is formed. A myriad of wildlife, including 150 species of birds and many threatened and endangered animals, thrive in the estuarine environment and surrounding upland hammocks and scrub found within the Reserve. Among the many things to see, we especially enjoyed watching the fish in the large aquarium at the center, the beautiful illustrated images of sharks, and the program on sharks in the Rookery Bay Reserve.

The mission of the Reserve is to provide a basis for informed coastal decisions through land management, restoration research and education. The Reserve works in partnership with local communities to promote coastal stewardship. The Rookery Bay Research Reserve is managed by the Florida Department of Environmental Protection in cooperation with the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

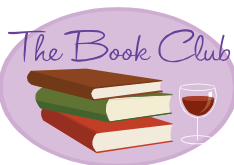

Nelleke Landay

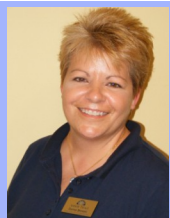

Though she is a person not comfortable with compliments, all who know her will agree that she is an exceptional individual. -Heidi Stryker



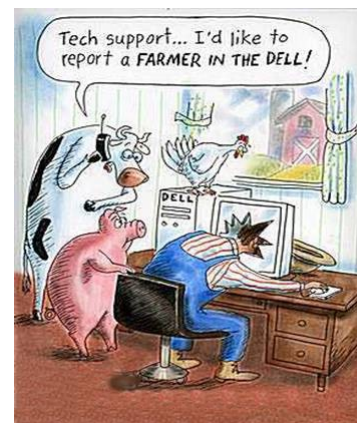
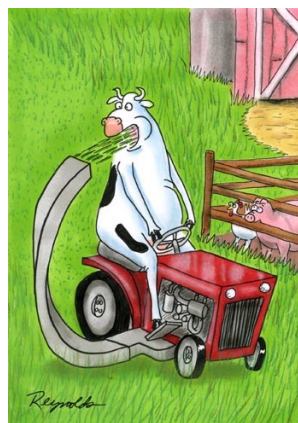
## Welcome New Arbor Trace Employee!
